#### From the Vicar

"We're here for a good time (not a long time)" is the title of a classic rock'n'roll song by *Trooper*. They're a Canadian group, so I don't expect many of you to have heard of them. The song popped into my head while I was considering what to write as we head into the summer months (worse songs from Canadian artists could have popped into my head, like *anything* from Celine Dion, which would have properly scuppered this article). What does it mean to have a good time? What underpins it?

The word I would like to explore is *leisure*. Some of you are thinking, "well I'm not getting any time off work, so don't talk to me about *leisure*..." Leisure is misunderstood today. Many people think leisure is not compatible with work, but it is. Also, leisure is not the same as lazing around and doing nothing. Leisure is more like "being at peace" in whatever we are doing.

Perhaps you may think this is a flippant subject, but how we spend our "spare time" is important. The most important thing we can do with our spare time is to spend it doing leisurely things. Leisure is not spending hours and hours in front of the TV or computer. Leisure is not sleeping all day. Leisure is not being slumped on a sofa wondering what on earth there is to do. True leisure has nothing to do with laziness or despondency.

Leisure is any activity that strengthens and expands our human nature. Leisure activities are those things that we do that deepen us, expand our skill-set, and keep us fit and healthy. Positive pursuits like reading a good book, doing crafts, playing

sports, gardening, building play forts or whatever are all leisure activities. These leisure activities are unnecessary because they depend upon us having "free time" (time not having to work for a living, keep the house in order, or flee from people or things trying to kill us). But on the other hand, life would not be worth living without these same unnecessary activities.

If we are working it is possible to be at leisure as well. It is possible to spend our time conscious of how our work can build up our character and our friendships with one another. If we have time to think at work, we can exercise our attentiveness to the world around us and to think about our lives and purpose. A truly happy work place is one that encourages true leisure in the midst of function. Space for leisure at work is maybe considered as bad for productivity, but in reality a work place that gives no space for moments of leisure throughout the day is proven to be negative both personally and productively.

But what is the root of leisure? A philosopher once said, "Culture depends for its very existence on leisure, and leisure, in its turn, is not possible unless it has a durable and consequently living link with the *cultus*, with divine worship." True leisure, activities that build up the human soul and body, ultimately need to be linked to worship. The Westminster Shorter Catechism puts it brilliantly with the question: "What is the chief end of man?" Answer: "To glorify God and to enjoy him forever."

Psalm 16:11 says, "You make known to me the path of life; in your presence there is fullness of joy; at your right hand are
